Message from the Chief Executive Officer

Welcome to our 29th Newsletter and the first in our 10th year as Three Saints Academy Trust. I would like to take a moment to reflect on our achievements over the 10 years of The Three Saints Academy Trust. We created the Trust on 1st August 2015 with just 2 schools: St Anns and St Mary & St Thomas. We quickly were awarded sponsor status by the DFE and in 2018 St Michael with St Thomas joined the Trust, St Michaels was facing considerable challenges at the time, we supported school to make improvements. This has become our USP, ensuring all staff in all our schools can provide the very best for every pupil. Our work as a National Maths Hub and with projects like 'Are you really reading?' And 'Nurturing young mathematicians' has seen us consistently support schools across the region. Blackmoor Park and Willow Tree joining us over the last 2 years has made us a Trust of 5 schools, but our focus remains the same; unwavering belief in every child and members of staff's potential. We can see the fruits of our labour in the Ofsted inspections that have taken place since creating the Trust, schools making huge improvements or remaining outstanding and with our national data being above national for both academic performance and attendance measures. We are very proud of our achievements and look forward to what the next decade of TTSAT will bring.

In November all our staff came together for our annual Trust training day, it was fabulous to see staff working together with such dedication and enthusiasm. All schools came together for a writing twilight in November where we disseminated some of the main messages from 'The Writing Framework.' All staff brought pupils' English books and showed great collaborative skills as they discussed the pupils' strengths and areas for development. All of this will support our teachers to make accurate and reliable teacher assessment judgements in writing.

We have special staff news to share; Mrs Mulligan from St Anns has given birth to a baby boy and we await news of Mrs Foster baby as she has just begun her MAT leave from St Anns.

We are as ever, very grateful to our families for their continued support and have been very happy to see our parents supporting Christmas events in our schools where we can all remember the true meaning of Christmas; the arrival of a baby King.

You will get a flavour of all our school's amazing work during the autumn term on the following pages, all our schools are very special places and testament to the hard work of all staff and leaders. All the staff, Directors and School Committees would like to extend their best wishes for the festive season and thank you for your continued support. Year 5 studied the Transatlantic Slave Trade and produced strong information texts and reflective poetry. Year 4 explored the journey of the Windrush Generation and created artwork that showed hope strength and identity. Year 3 investigated the



Industrial Revolution and looked at how inventions changed daily life. Year 2 learned about the


experience of World War Two evacuees and used replica artefacts and role play to imagine life away from home.
